## FARM BILL: Help End Hunger in our Community

The farm bill is federal legislation that governs many nutrition and agriculture programs, and it is up for renewal. This legislation allocates funding for The Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). Together these programs help to bridge the food gap for millions of families and individuals facing hunger across the country.

# Feeding America urges Congress to support and strengthen our nation's nutrition and agriculture programs in the next farm bill.

#### (1) Understand the Scale of Hunger in America

- Hunger exists in every county, parish and borough in the United States. More than 47 million people, including nearly 14 million children, face hunger in the U.S.<sup>1</sup>
- As grocery bills and other costs of living continue to rise, more households are turning to food banks to meet their needs.
  - 49 million people turned to the charitable food sector for help in 2022.<sup>2</sup>
  - In 2022, food prices increased by 9.9%. In 2023, food prices increased by 5.8%.<sup>3</sup>
  - A recent survey found that 82% of likely voters are concerned about high food prices.4

#### 2) See the Local Impact of TEFAP and SNAP

TEFAP and SNAP work together to help ensure people in our community can put food on the table every day.

In a recent survey, 93% of likely voters said that TEFAP is an important program.<sup>5</sup>

**TEFAP** helped the Feeding America network distribute 1.22 billion pounds of food in 2023.<sup>6</sup>



**SNAP** helped more than 42 million people access nutritious foods in 2023.<sup>7</sup>
